


POWER OF TRADITION

THE ACQUAVELLA FAMILY

Being behind the times has never been so desirable as at Acquavella Galleries, which, since its founding in 1921 by Nicholas Acquavella, has made a pretty penny brokering million-dollar deals on the new classics to successive generations. Headed up today by Nicholas's son, William, the New York gallery's sterling reputation rests on its rich inventory of European masters, as well as American Pop artists like James Rosenguist. In recent years the gallery has surprised some clients by signing living painters such as Enoc Perez and Zeng Fanzhi, a move many credit to the increasing involvement of William's sons Alexander and Nicholas, and daughter Eleanor Dejoux. This year the gallery opened its doors even wider when it invited Vito Schnabel to curate "White Collar Crimes," featuring Dan Colen and the Bruce High Quality Foundation, at its tony 79th Street town house.
