## ASIAN ART EXHIBITIONS IN EUROPE

## IN EUROPE, LONDON REMAINS THE CENTER

for international contemporary art. Top galleries there have been at the forefront of promoting Asian artists. Victoria Miro started the year with Tracey Moffatt (1/20-2/18), whose world tour made stops in New York at Steven Kasher Gallery (3/7-4/29), Edinburgh at Stills Gallery (7/28-10/29) and Atlanta at Fay Gold Gallery (12/5-1/1/07). Miro also showed American mixed media artist Anne Chu (4/8-5/6), rising Israeli-born Danish painter Tal R (5/13-6/23) and Idris Khan (9/2-30).

Albion Gallery filled its calendar with some of the best practicing artists today: Mariko Mori (10/9 – 12/22), Lee Mingwei (10/11 – 11/8), Wang Qingsong (6/6 – 7/28), Su-Mei Tse (5/22 – 6/30) and photographs by Simryn Gill coinciding with her show at Tate Modern (3/21 – 5/12).

Lisson Gallery showed conceptual media artist Tim Lee (4/7 -5/6, SEE AAP 50), also appearing in New York at Cohan and Leslie (3/31 - 4/29), and Anish Kapoor (10/13 - 11/18, SEE P. 82). Stephen Friedman hosted Yoshitomo Nara and graf (2/3 - 3/11, SEE JAPAN). Stuart Shave/Modern Art presented Australian Ricky Swallow's stunning woodcarvings (11/17 - 12/21, SEE AAP 45). Frith Street Gallery unveiled Fiona Tan's two-channel video installation The Changeling (2006) in "Short Voyages" (9/15 - 10/28). Annely Juda introduced Chun Kwang-Young's "Aggregations" (6/7 - 7/1, see AAP 51), which also opened the fall season at Kim Foster in New York (9/7 - 10/21). Kenny Schacter/Rove splashed on sculptural models by London-based Iraqi architect Zaha Hadid (10/14 - 11/14), who also showed in New York at Max Protetch (6/1 - 7/29). White Cube scored Mona Hatoum's first London show since 2002 for its Mason's Yard venue (11/24 - 12/22). Union Gallery presented "Give Me Shelter" including young Korean stars Lee Dongwook, Lee Hyungkoo and Gwon Osang (9/19 - 11/28).

On the continent, Paris enjoyed ambitious new paintings by Takashi Murakami (SEE P. 162) at Emmanuel Perrotin (10/21 – 12/23), which also exhibited Murakami cohort Mr. at its space in Miami (3/4 – 6/4). Anne de Villepoix presented drawings and sculptural work by seminal Chinese artist Huang Yongping (3/1 – 4/22), following up with paintings by Changhwa Hwang (12/1 – 1/20/07). Galerie Zurcher showed Chinese "Stars" group figurehead Wang Keping (2/2 – 3/4) and Indian media artist Pushpamala N. (9/18 – 11/8). Marian Goodman's Paris venue showed Hiroshi Sugimoto (9/16 – 10/25), whose exhibition at Patrick de Brock in Belgium extended into early 2006 (12/17/05 – 1/23). Chantal Crousel started the year with Rirkrit Tiravanija (1/14 – 2/25, SEE P. 225). Nathalie Obadia included Israeli video-artist Guy Ben-Ner (10/21 – 12/9, SEE AAP 51), while Rina Banerjee (SEE AAP 51), who showed at AMT

Gallery in Como (6/10 - 7/28), Italy, this year, will lead off 2007 (1/13/07 - 2/28/07).

To the South, Spain's gallery circuit made room early in the year for Japanese media artist Shimabuku at Galeria Nogueras Blanchard (11/17/05 – 1/14/06), Barcelona, and Chinese performance photographer Li Wei at Galeria Espacio Minimo (1/12 – 2/25), Madrid, which later exhibited Liang Yuanwei and Yang Jing (9/14 – 10/31). Also in Madrid, Galeria Soledad Lorenzo showcased Taiwanese painter Suling Wang (2/16 – 3/18). Korean photographer Bae Bien-U appeared at Galeria Metta (6/15 – 7/31, SEE AAP 48) and Japanese photographer Miwa Yanagi at Galeria Leyendecker (3/10 – 4/30), Santa Cruz de Tenerife.

Photography and new media barnstormed Italy. In Milan, Nobuyoshi Araki showed at Zonca & Zonca (11/24 - 1/20/07), and Yasumasa Morimura was at Galleria Ca' di Fra' (5/18 - 6/17). Prometeogallery had Turkish video artist Gülsün Karamustafa (3/21 - 4/21) and Paul Chan slipped into a group show at Massimo de Carlo (open 7/2). Izima Kaoru hit Studio La Citta (2/25 - 4/1), Verona. Hiraki Sawa's animations debuted at Studio Guenzani (6/8 - 7/15). In Turin, Lida Abdul had her first European solo show at Giorgio Persano (3/8 - 5/20) and Vitamin Arte Contemporanea explored "Ex-Otica" through four artists, Chitra Ganesh, Mithu Sen, Rashid Rana and Hong Kong's Wai Kit Lam (11/9 - 1/13/07). In Rome, Valentina Bonomo had the potent combination of Dayanita Singh (5/31 - 9/30) followed by Shahzia Sikander in October.

Artists from West Asia featured in Germany. Walid Raad showed at Sfeir-Semler's Hamburg location (9/9 – 10/21). Mona Hatoum (4/28 – 6/3) and Haluk Akakçe (6/9 – 7/15) were at Max Hetzler in Berlin. Guy Ben-Ner lead off the year at Konrad Fischer Galerie (1/28 – 3/4), followed by Yuji Takeoka (6/24 – 7/22) and On Kawara (10/28 – 11/17). Pursuing the Japanese thread, Arndt & Partner exhibited Yayoi Kusama at its Berlin venue (9/16 – 10/21). Also of note, Australian photographer Rosemary Laing showed at Galerie Konrads in Dusseldorf (9/16 – 11/30).

Other exhibitions of note in Europe include Wang Du at Baronian Francey Gallery in Brussels (1/19-2/25) and Meiro Koizumi at Annet Gelink in Amsterdam (2/9-3/25). Further afield, Moscow's Marat Guelman Gallery exhibited Kazakh artist Erbossyn Meldibekov (3/20-4/7), and Asian contemporary art touched down in South Africa at Cape Town's 34Long, which hawked Takashi Murakami's editioned prints and mass-produced merchandise (11/14-12/9) and organized a group show of Chinese, Japanese and South African artists, "South-East" (12/13/05-1/14/06).
